

Join us on this unforgettable seven-night helicopter safari to discover Virunga National Park, Africa's oldest and most spectacular national park. On this unique safari to Virunga, you will come face to face with a family of mountain gorillas, and watch chimpanzees swinging through the trees. You will fly in a helicopter over the snow-capped Rwenzori mountains, and hover over volcanoes and lava lakes. You'll also have the chance of seeing lions, elephants, hippos and buffalo in lush savannah. All of this, in one park, in one week.

Virunga is one of the most beautiful landscapes on the planet, and the most diverse national park in Africa: half of all the species on the continent are found in Virunga. It's deservedly a World Heritage Site. If ever there was a movie for the natural life on Planet Earth, Virunga would play a starring role. This unique, customized, privately-guided helicopter safari of Virunga National Park and surrounds is available in March 2020.

HIGHLIGHTS

The **helicopter safari** includes eight actionpacked days in Virunga;

- Gorilla trekking with both mountain gorillas in Virunga National Park and Grauer's gorillas in nearby Kahuzi-Biega National Park.
- Flying over the Rwenzoris, the largest snow-capped mountain range in Africa, also known as "mountains of the moon".
- Watching chimps in the rugged terrain of Tongo.
- Flying in a helicopter to the top of Mount Nyiragongo, an active volcano with lava lake, and spending the night at the top.
- Visiting the Senkwekwe gorilla orphanage, where you'll meet the inspirational rangers who look after the orphaned gorillas that have been saved from poachers.
- Exploring Lulimbi's isolated savannah plains, where you'll have a chance to see elephants, hippos, lions and buffalo.

You will also have insider access to the Virunga headquarters at Rumangabo, where you'll learn about what it takes to protect this remarkable park and its wildlife, amid all the challenges.





DETAILS

We have four set-departure dates starting from Sunday 1st – weekly, continuing on the 8th/15th and 22nd of March 2020. Fully inclusive prices start from \$1850* per person per day, including all flights to and from Nairobi to DR Congo, all helicopter excursions, Mountain Gorilla, Grauer's Gorilla and Chimp permits, volcano permits, park fees, all transfers and accommodation, food and laundry. This fee does not include international flights, visas, gratuities, drinks and tobacco.

You will be met at Wilson Airport in Nairobi in the morning by a member of our team, before embarking on a charter flight

to Goma in DR Congo, (this is where you will clear customs in DR Congo) and then onto the Virunga park headquarters at Rumangabo. On arrival you will be transferred by road 15 minutes to Mikeno Lodge to check in and meet your guides. There will be two groups of 4, with a private guide allocated to each group. This will be your guide for the duration of the trip and he will stay with you throughout your time in Virunga National Park. Mikeno Lodge will be your base for the next seven days. You will each be assigned a luxury thatched cottage for the week, enabling you to unpack your belongings. All the excursions and treks will be based from Mikeno Lodge.

*Rate is per person/per day and not inclusive of optional extra excursions. Single supplements apply.





DAY 1: Arrive in Virunga National Park – afternoon scenic helicopter flight around the volcanoes - overnight at Mikeno Lodge

DAY 2: Drive to Bukima Tented Camp – set off on Gorilla Trek – return to Mikeno Lodge for lunch – evening helicopter flight for sundownders on Nyamuragira volcano – overnight at Mikeno Lodge

DAY 3: Early morning helicopter flight to Lulimbi Tented Camp* – lunch at Lulimbi Tented Camp – evening guided walk in the savannah of the park – overnight Lulimbi Tented Camp

*There is the option to fly up to see Rwenzori Mountains on our way to Lulimbi Tented Camp. This amazing flight will take you across most of Virunga National Park to the ice capped peaks of the Rwenzori Mountains. This flight is not costed in this itinerary and will be an optional extra.

DAY 4: Morning game drive around Lulimbi – late morning helicopter flight to Mikeno Lodge for lunch – visit to the Congo Hounds - afternoon helicopter flight up Nyiragongo Volcano – dinner and overnight on the rim of Nyiragongo Volcano

DAY 5: Early morning helicopter flight along Lake Kivu to Kahuzi
Biega – lowland gorilla trek in Kahuzi Biega – helicopter flight to
Tchegera for lunch – afternoon helicopter flight back to Mikeno Lodge
– visit to Senkwekwe Gorilla Orphanage – dinner and overnight at
Mikeno Lodge

DAY 6: Early morning helicopter flight to Tongo – Chimp trek in Tongo – return to Mikeno Lodge for lunch – afternoon option of Chimp trek at Mikeno Lodge or just rest – dinner and overnight Mikeno Lodge

DAY 7: Charter flight from Rumangabo back to Nairobi Wilson Airport – Itinerary ends

Please note that all these locations and activities will take place in your itinerary (weather dependant) but the order as to which they will happen will differ depending on which group you are in.

THE HELICOPTER

The helicopter we will use in the Congo is an Airbus AS350, which many of you have had the pleasure of flying in with us in Kenya. This helicopter will be based at Mikeno Lodge and fly excursions from the lodge every day depending on the activity for the day and group.





The Democratic Republic of Congo isn't an obvious tourist destination, and has often been given a bad press by the international media (as media are prone to do). But this country deserves a much better reputation. It's an astoundingly beautiful country, and it's people are some of the friendliest and most welcoming in Africa! Most visitors who come to Congo are overwhelmingly surprised by how special – and safe – it is. The DRC (not to be confused with Republic of Congo to the west) is a former Belgian colony, and the biggest country in Africa. Lying straddled on the equator, and containing Africa's largest expanse of rainforest, it is one of the least known and least explored places on the planet. The abundance of natural wonders – especially in Virunga – is awe-inspiring. If you're looking to experience a safari that is unlike any other, then this helicopter safari is for you.

Emmanuel De Merode is warden of Virunga. He and his 750 rangers have gained international recognition for protecting Virunga and improving the livelihoods of the surrounding communities. Virunga is now a highly rated adventure tourism destination, and more than 10 000 visitors have come to the park in the past few years. The park relies on donations and tourism revenue to fund its operations, so without tourists, the park faces a cash shortage. The jobs created from tourism have already made a big difference to the local people, and various other park-funded infrastructure – like hydroelectric power – has helped create security and wealth in one of the poorest regions on the planet.




YOU WILL SAVE MONEY

The reason why we are doing a set date departure is because we are using a helicopter to explore the Congo for these trips. By grouping all the trips together, we can split the costs of the helicopter transfers between all the people in the groups to make it more affordable. By travelling out of 'peak season' flights from the USA are cheaper and accommodation is less expensive. If you were to visit the gorillas in Rwanda, a single entry park fee for the gorillas is \$1500 per person per day!

More than 160 of Virunga's rangers have died in the line of duty in the past 10 years, the most of any park on the planet. Despite this, Virunga's dedicated rangers still risk their lives every day to protect the mountain gorillas and hundreds of other species of animals. The Virunga Widows' Fund has been set up to ensure that the basic needs of widowed ranger families are met, including health care, primary education for their children, and a basic pension allowance. You safari will directly be contributing to the Virunga rangers widow fund.

MIKEY CARR-HARTLEY

John is a third-generation Kenyan and a well-known and respected professional hunter. His knowledge of wildlife and their habitats is extensive. John is also passionate about photography and is always keen to lend a hand to anyone interested in learning more. His photographic work has been exhibited and sold overseas for various charitable organisations, such as The Tusk Trust and The African Rainforest Conservancy Trust.



GARY HOPCRAFT

Gary is Tanya's cousin, born and brought up on the Hopcraft family farm on the edge of Lake Naivasha in the Great Rift Valley, Kenya. As a child he was either at home on the farm or on safari with his father. This is where he learnt to love and understand East Africa's wildlife, alongside developing a keen interest in photography. MARK BOYD



His background is in ecology and conservation biology and he is an expert photographer. He has guided safaris all over East Africa including Sudan, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda, as well of course in Congo where he has been leading gorilla safaris to Virunga for many years.



SCOTT RAMSAY

Photographer & writer

Scott is a South African photographer and writer who has spent the past ten years photographing and writing about Africa's parks and reserves. To date he has explored over 100 protected areas in twelve different countries on the continent. Growing up in Cape Town, he first worked in management consulting and finance, before completing a masters in Journalism at Northwestern University in Chicago. He then began immersing himself in African wilderness areas, using his camera, pen and talks to create awareness for the continent's national parks and wildlife. His first photographic book South Africa's Wildest Places was published in 2016.





Virunga National Park is one of the most inspiring destinations in the world. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site located in eastern DR Congo, on the border of Uganda and Rwanda. Virunga is Africa's oldest national park and is also the continent's most biologically diverse protected area.

The park's 7,800 square kilometres (3,000 square miles) includes forests, savannahs, lava plains, swamps, erosion valleys, active volcanoes, and the glaciated peaks of the Rwenzori mountains.

Virunga is home to 22 primate species, the most of any place on Earth. Included in this list is the critically endangered mountain gorilla, of which there are about 300 in the park (a third of the world's population). There are also Grauer's gorillas and chimpanzees, making Virunga the only park in the world to host three types of great apes. Another prominent inhabitant of the park is the Okapi, an endangered species that resembles a zebra but is more closely related to the giraffe. Large colonies of hippopotami, forest and savannah elephants, lions, and numerous

rare bird species can also be found in the park.

Some 750 park rangers protect the park and its wildlife from poachers, rebel groups, illegal miners and land invasions. The park contains seven of the eight volcanoes in the Virunga mountain range that sprawls across the borders of Congo, Rwanda and Uganda.

Biologist George Schaller noted that the name "virunga" comes from the Kinyarwanda word "kirunga", meaning "high isolated mountains that reach the clouds". It's an apt description and certainly fits the six dormant volcanoes (Karisimbi, Mikeno, Muhabura, Visoke, Sabyinyo and Gahinga). When it comes to Mounts Nyiragongo and Nyamuragira, maybe the other local name - "mufumbiro" - is more fitting, and certainly less euphemistic: "the mountains which cook". These are volcanoes with active lava lakes. Karisimbi is the highest at 4 507m.



MIKENO LODGE

Mikeno Lodge is a luxurious lodge tucked into a forested hillside at Virunga National Park Headquarters and is the perfect base for visiting the mountain gorillas. The lodge is situated between three major attractions in Virunga National Park. Its location provides you with amazing panoramic views over the Virunga rift valley and you are only a short walk away are the Virunga HQ and the Gorilla Orphanage.

There is an abundance of bird life, as well as resident blue monkeys, colobus monkeys, and baboons. Chimpanzees are also frequent visitors to the area.







GORILLA TREKKING FROM BUKIMA TENTED CAMP TO SEE THE MOUNTAIN GORILLAS


There are approximately 1,100 mountain gorillas left on earth and one third of them live in the Mikeno sector of Virunga National Park. The remaining mountain gorillas live on the other side of the border with Virunga National Park in Rwanda and Uganda, within the Virunga Massif.

You will drive from Mikeno Lodge to Bukima Tented Camp, where you will embark on a gorilla trek through the tropical forest to spend an awe-inspiring hour in the company of a band of gorillas. From a short distance away, you can take in the impressive sight of a 400lb silverback as he keeps a watchful eye over his family. You will also be able to observe young gorillas pumping their chests, mothers tenderly feeding their young and watch baby gorillas gleefully playfighting, somersaulting and leaping from tree to tree in their natural environment.









LULIMBI TENTED CAMP

Lulimbi lies in the Ishasha Valley, on the eastern edge of the park's Central Sector. In striking contrast with the volcanoes and gorillas of the south, this beautiful area is dominated by savannah plains, through which the Ishasha River cuts its way and is home to many of the park's elephants and hippos.

The location offers good access to savannah wildlife, experienced rangers and an opportunity to participate in the area's conservation from this quieter, off-beat location. The camp itself consists of shared mess tent and eight en-suite sleeping tents. The tents all face the Ishasha River, with private verandas perfectly positioned to watch a nearby pod of hippos.

This area showcases a completely different terrain to the park's southern camps and serves as a pleasant reminder that Virunga remains largely unexplored and inaccessible to tourism. Lulimbi's savannah plains are enticingly isolated, and as you watch the crocodiles bask on the sand banks, it feels so far away from the gorilla habitat in other parts of the park.

Your stay here will consist mainly of walking safaris with rangers, and participation in the research activities, including elephant monitoring, wildlife counts, and chimpanzee behavioral studies within the Ishasha Valley.










CHIMP TREKKING IN TONGO

Tongo sits to the northwest of Virunga Park headquarters of Rumangabo. Tongo is a small 300-year-old forest that sits on top of a lava flow from Nyamulagira Volcano and is home to a small population of wild chimpanzees. Back in 1987, the Frankfurt Zoological Society (FZS), a partner of the park, developed a network of trails through the four distinct hills of Tongo, and habituated the chimpanzees for tourism. Civil unrest put an end to tourism, but in the summer of 2010, FZS re-launched the habituation process with a dedicated team of Community Trackers

who have spent the last few years finding the chimps and spending the day with them in order to make them comfortable with a human presence. According to current (cautious) estimates, there are at least 35 chimpanzees in Tongo. You will trek for about 1 hour from the clearing where the helicopter will land to reach the chimps, sometimes over hilly and rough terrain (the area around here is made up of sharp lava rocks covered in slippery moss). It will certainly be worth it, however, as chimps provide a very different experience compared to a gorilla trek.




GORILLA TREKKING IN KAHUZI-BIEGA NATIONAL PARK TO SEE THE GRAUER'S GORILLAS

Kahuzi-Biega National Park is a hidden secret and a UNESCO World Heritage Site situated in the eastern part of DR Congo near Bukavu town. This National Park is a relatively new tourism attraction that is less known and rarely traversed, therefore, offers guests a unique experience. Kahuzi-Biega National Park was established in 1970 covering a total land area of approximately 6,000 square kilometres.

The park encompasses a vast area of primary tropical forest dominated by two spectacular extinct volcanoes, Kahuzi and Biega, the park has a diverse and abundant fauna. One of the last groups of eastern (graueri) gorillas (consisting of only some 250 individuals) lives at between 2,100 and 2,400 m above sea-level.






RWENZORI MOUNTAINS

Known also as the "Mountains of the Moon," the Rwenzoris reach a height of 5,109 m (16,761 ft) and contain the largest glaciers left on the African continent. The Rwenzoris lie in western Uganda along the Uganda-Congo border. The equatorial snow peaks include the third highest point in Africa, while the lower slopes are blanketed in moorland, bamboo and rich, moist montane forest.

The helicopter flight across the Rwenzoris will enable you to access this part of the park and mountain range with effort and ease. On this flight you will see a stunning variety of landscapes, including bamboo and giant fern forests, alpine meadows and lakes, and of course the famous snow-capped peaks. The flora and fauna of the Rwenzoris is equally diverse. Forest elephant, Okapi, chimpanzees, and numerous bird species make the Rwenzoris their home.

Mikey Carr-Hartley took me to Virunga in the summer of 2014, just after its southern sector had re-opened after years of war and political upheaval. Together we tracked mountain gorillas and climbed Nyiragongo, a live volcano 3,470 metres high, where we camped on the rim of the world's largest lava lake. Westerners may be nervous about visiting the Democratic Republic of Congo, but it is an amazing, undiscovered country and with Mikey they will be in the best possible hands.
